JULY MEMBER SPOTLIGHT — RENEE STURKIE

Renee Sturkie is the Executive Director of the Ronald McDonald House Charities of West Georgia, Inc. The Ronald McDonald House was built in 1994 to provide housing, meals, and perhaps most importantly emotional support to families who are from out of town and are staying here to be with their sick or critically injured child who is being treated in one of our area hospitals. It is a "home away from home" for these families, providing them a comfortable room with a private bath, hot home-cooked meals daily,

transportation to and from the hospital, laundry facilities, computer/Wi-Fi access, and plenty of room for rest and reflection - just what they need after spending long hours with unimaginable stresses at the hospital with their child. Most families have a pre-term, multiple birth or otherwise critically ill infant in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) at Midtown Medical Center, but many others have a child who has suffered traumatic injury or who has a prolonged or chronic illness. Some families are military, coming to The House by way of our proximity to Fort Benning.
